Amanda brought lots of new energy to our council and championed the wellbeing of our residents, ensuring everyone in our community had a voice. Amanda always made sure that she shared her views on any subject and she gave her all to everything she did. Her sense of humour will also be missed at our meetings.

Amanda's passing is a huge loss to our council and our community. She was truly admired by councillors and staff alike. The council was only part of Amanda's work and there are many people who are living better lives today because of her. Amanda was an inspiration and her impact and legacy in our local community will continue.

All councillors and officers send their deepest condolences to Amanda's family and friends at this very sad time.

We were very proud to have Amanda as a councillor for Bletchley and Fenny Stratford.

Chair's Foreword

Since we entered into a new four-year council session in May 2022, I am delighted to introduce you to a report on our activities in the last year. This year has been one of transition for both the community as we learn to live with COVID, but also for the Council with some Councillors retiring and many new joiners.

One of the first things we did as a new Council in 2021 was to agree our vision, mission and values and the key strategic priorities, and our delivery plan. This work has led to us making many changes to the way we work as an organisation. We have recently moved from a leased building at Bletchley Library and moved to the first Town Council offices we have ever owned at Sycamore House in Water Eaton, right at the centre of the communities we serve.

We know many of our residents have found living throughout the pandemic very challenging. The community have told us, they want us to keep supporting our wellbeing initiatives such as free swimming, free face to face counselling, providing essential food support through the Community Larder scheme and to keep providing essential youth club services as well as free toilets in Bletchley Town Centre amongst other things. We have therefore had to make some difficult decisions made in relation to the council budget, but they are to the benefit of the community. As councillors we did debate the right thing to do, we of course appreciate it is a really difficult time for local residents, we managed to keep our precept increase very low in 2020 and 2021, if we had not increased the precept this year, we could not continue to fund much needed services, which are needed more than ever right now.

I know lots of you are asking what has happened to the £22.3 million allocated through the Groundbreaking Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Town Deal. We are an active partner in the Town Deal, led by Milton Keynes Council, but they are medium term projects which have not yet had a visible impact on the town, but the money is the catalyst to unlock those improvements in the future. We look forward to these schemes being developed further this year. Our Council is also supporting the creation of a Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Neighbourhood Plan and the first round of public consultation took place in March 2022, this is a real opportunity for us to influence the future development of our area so please do continue to raise any issues on the CommonPlace app at bfsnpfeedback.commonplace.is

Bletchley and Fenny Stratford has many people here that do amazing and inspirational things but receive little credit, and we as a Council want to recognise these brilliant people. I am pleased to let you know we will having our first PRIDE of Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Awards this year. We will be looking for you to nominate local residents for the work they have done with the local community. Visit our website to nominate now.

It has been a real delight to meet many of you at our regular events in Bletchley, and I know that people want to see a more vibrant town centre, so we will be having 11 town centre events this year, designed to bring more footfall into Bletchley. We are introducing regular vegan markets, as well as farmers and craft markets plus events at Easter, Summer and Christmas - we are investing in bringing more people into Bletchley town centre, more often.

Whilst you are welcome to meet any council meeting, we particularly would like to invite to our Annual Meeting of Electors on 12 May 2022 and to hold the meeting at Fenny Stratford Community Centre, George Street, Fenny Stratford at 7.30pm.

Overview of Council Work 2021-2022

Council Governance

In May 2021 Town Council elections took place. These had been postponed for a year because of the Covid-19 pandemic. Seven councillors were elected for the first time and during the council year two further co-options have taken place to fill casual vacancies.

At the same time the regulations which allowed the Town Council to hold remote meetings ended and the Council returned to face-to-face meetings. These have been held in the Sports Hall at Newton Leys Pavilion because this large space enabled social distancing to continue. At the annual meeting a new Chair of the Council was elected. Cllr Ethaniel Kelly-Wilson took the place of former Cllr Angela Kennedy who was thanked as she stepped down from her long and valuable service as Chair and her contribution to the community. A full list of councillors who have served during 2021-2022 is included at the end of this report together with their attendance records.

Agendas and minutes of meetings together with financial and other reports from the year are available on the Town Council website www.bletchleyfennystratford-tc.gov.uk. The Council's unaudited accounts are also included in this report. This year Councillors have made decisions in the context of the Council's newly adopted strategic priorities and values. The Council has undertaken an annual survey to check that councillors are fully representing the views of their community and that we are informing the electorate about what we are doing. We also stepped up our social engagement activities for the same reason.

The Town Council commissioned a Best Practice review of all its services and activities and has been working through implementation of the independent recommendations arising from this review. A medium-term financial plan has also been adopted which is available on the website. The Town Council has continued to fulfil its statutory duties throughout the year and to provide a range of different services. I am pleased to report that the last twelve months have seen the Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Neighbourhood Plan kick into gear. A Neighbourhood Plan is a document that gives communities direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape the development and growth of their local area.

The main focus of the steering group's work this year has been consulting the public and finding out what is important for those who live and work in the area. Highlights have included local pop-ups and the launch of our first major online survey. The public consultation stage is one of the most important in the development of the plan and will direct our work going forward.

Thank you very much to every resident who has shared their views with our team at a local event or via the survey. The next twelve months will be equally important, as we begin speaking with planning consultants who will help our group formulate the Neighbourhood Plan.

This is an exciting stage in the development of the plan, and we are looking for new members to join our steering group. This is composed of local people and businesses set up to steer the preparation of the plan and to seek the views of local people.

'The Picnic in the Park was a great success which was hosted to over 600 residents from the estate and wider without the funding and support from the town council this would not of been possible to hold we thank you for your support.'

A quote from Fenny Festival Community Group on receiving a community grant:

'A short note of thanks to Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Town Council for the additional support given that aided the operation of the Poppers Festival in 2021. The logistical and financial hurdles were considerable to present a festival with sufficient attractions in what was considered a 'safe' environment. The on the ground assistance of council employees on the day was especially helpful.



The hostile environment meant that many stall operators had simply stopped trading so income levels were diminished and other organisations had reduced their staff so had to scale back what they could provide. In the face of these challenges a well attended festival took place that remained free to enter and enjoy. Looking forward we are pleased to advise that we have had a number of new enquiries for the forthcoming year and plans have commenced for Sunday 14th August 2022.'

Community Grant Recipients

A quote from Queensway Methodist Church:

'Thanks to a grant from Bletchley & Fenny Stratford Town Council, we are progressing with our community garden project. We have had a very good response to our achievements so far.

We are ready to start using the raised vegetable beds. They are assembled and filled with soil. When Knowles Primary School children visit again, they will see the fruits of their labours from the bulb planting they did with us in January and be able to plant some fruit and vegetables. We have already planted two fruit trees (apple and pear) in church grounds.

The paved play area to the right of the Church Hall has been laid, but with some finishing touches still to be done. However, it has already been put to good use. Queensway Toddlers now have a more accessible outside play area where parents/carers can sit and watch the children play. The Community Café has started using it too.

We have been blessed with donations of outdoor plastic chairs and bistro tables and chairs which makes for a comfortable chat over coffee and cake.


We are slightly behind schedule due to Covid, but plan to finish the patio area, paths around the raised beds and install water butts before the end of April.'

Fenny Stratford Community Centre Survey



June 2021

The Fenny Stratford Community Centre Online Survey went live on 30th June 2021, with paper copies available to collect at the Town Council's offices. The Town Council team had recently been working on improvements to the Community Centre with the aim to re-open the Centre to the public in late summer or early autumn 2021. The Town Council wanted to hear from local residents and find out their thoughts about the future use of the building and to understand what facilities are needed in the area.

94 people completed the survey, with 55% of respondents saying that the dedicated snooker table space should not be kept (this space is now used for a Preschool) and all respondents gave a wide range of suggestions for use of the spaces which included: community events, fitness/dance classes and allowing the spaces to be hired out for private hire events. Bookings for hire of Fenny Stratford Community Centre went live in September 2021, following a celebratory opening Coffee Morning (read more on page 16). A community canalside walk took place on 8th July 2021. The canalside visit was organised by John Best, Chair of the Bedford & Milton Keynes Waterway Trust, and the Town Council, with Cllr Richard Graham and Cllr Terry Stephens attending. We were delighted to be joined by the Mayor of Milton Keynes, Cllr Mohammed Khan, Ward Cllr Emily Darlington, Ophelia Cole from community group Action Speaks and Pat Durham and Diane Witts from the IWA Milton Keynes Branch.

Good discussions took place about the canalside within our area. We also all got to enjoy and experience the surrounding nature and wildlife - seeing ducks, swans and a heron! The Town Council has entered into partnership with Bedford & Milton Keynes Waterway Trust and we will continue to work together to promote and improve the canalside in our area.



July 2021

Public Toilets Consultation

Consultation on Public Toilets in Bletchley Town Centre went live in July 2021. The survey could be completed online and paper copies were available to collect from the Town Council's buildings. This survey received nearly 1000 responses. The majority of responses said how valued the toilets, with 82.7% of respondents believing that the current service offered good value for money and that based on the current costs, 93% of those surveyed believe the Town Council should continue to provide public toilets in the centre of Bletchley.

Following the consultation on the Public Toilets, Albert Street Public Toilets are now also open on Sundays between 9.30am-4.30pm. The Public Toilets continue to be open 7.30am-6pm Monday-Saturday.



MKPA Free Summer Play Sessions

MKPA Free Summer Play Sessions started on 26th July 2021. The sessions in our area were funded by the Town Council and enjoyed by lots of our youngest residents.

In July 2021, the Town Council adopted two new dog bins in Leon Recreation Grounds. These were installed by Milton Keynes Council without the Town Council's knowledge as part of a programme of improvements to Leon Recreation Grounds.

New Neighbourhood Plan Website

By the end of July 2021, the new Neighbourhood Plan website was launched.

This has been regularly updated with the Steering Group's progress, meeting dates and information as to how local residents can share their views and inform the Neighbourhood Plan going forward.

Town Council gains White Ribbon Accreditation



Bletchley and Fenny Stratford Town Council has taken a stand to end all male violence against women by becoming White Ribbon Accredited. White Ribbon is a global campaign that encourages people, and especially men and boys, to individually and collectively take action and change the behaviour and culture that leads to abuse and violence. To wear a white ribbon is to promise to never to commit, excuse or remain silent about male violence against women. Commitments made by the Town Council in our White Ribbon action plan include appointing volunteer ambassadors to carry the message out to more men and raising awareness within our local community.


Cllr Amanda Carter Philpott, who led this activity on behalf of the Town Council, said 'We are very proud to achieve White Ribbon Accreditation in such a short period of time and this is just the beginning. We invite residents to join us on this journey to promote ending violence towards women and girls'.

2021 marked the first year of the Town Council promoting the 16 days of activism that take place globally to promote the ending of violence against women and girls. The Town Council hosted and supported a series of online and in person inspiring events, notably 'The Suitcase' by CEO of MK Act, Sue Burke.

Council Finances 2021-2022

Draft annual accounts for the year ending 31 March 2022 are included in this report to provide a comparison with last year's accounts. These accounts will be subject to internal audit during April 2022 and subsequently to external audit. Full details of the audit process and all our audit reports are available on our website www.bletchleyfennystratford-tc.gov.uk and any questions about the accounts should be addressed to the Finance Manager at finance@bletchleyfennystratford-tc.gov.uk.

To summarise, like many other organisations both public and private, the Town Council was affected by the economic repercussions of the Covid-19 pandemic. The rental income at Newton Leys Pavilion was reduced until the social distancing and social gathering restrictions were completely removed in September 2021; Fenny Stratford Community Centre opened to the public in September 2021 and income exceeded the anticipated budget. The Town Council finally recruited the additional posts planned in the budget and Sycamore House was purchased as the permanent office base; whilst the cost of the new premises is included in the expenditure, the Town Council was able to use an earmarked reserve specifically set up to meet the anticipated cost.

The overall outcome of the year's finances was an overspend of £22,643 which was met by the general reserve, The original budget, however, was a deficit budget of £96,452, therefore the Council's financial position improved over the course of the 12 month period.
